At Alexandra Park, we implement a music curriculum that is designed to be both progressive and Implementation cumulative, allowing children to not only revisit skills taught previously as they progress through the school, but also to improve upon them and feel a sense of achievement as they do so. As the children move through the school, their lessons change and adapt to reflect their growth. Skills based work extends into exploration, which in turn develops their ear for melody and rhythm, thereby giving them confidence to begin analysing music they hear using the correct musical vocabulary. This approach allows children to feel a sense of success, and the differentiation built into the lessons ensures all can take part. A variety of teaching approaches are used and lessons are planned to include opportunities for children to work as pairs, in groups and to work independently. Music is taught weekly, focusing on the knowledge and skills stated in the National Curriculum and Key

Progression Document ensuring that knowledge builds progressively and that children develop skills systematically. Connections between subjects are made to reinforce learning where appropriate. Music teaching focuses on enabling children to think as musicians.

Within our music teaching we include 'The Seven Steps' to support children to develop key knowledge and vocabulary. (Movement, Games, Creativity, Ownership, Challenge, Meaning, Celebration). New information and knowledge is introduced in small steps, differentiated when appropriate.

	Effective questioning is a crucial component of all our lessons. Key questions are planned to encourage children to think about their learning, to reflect upon previous learning and to make connections between new and existing learning. We encourage children to build upon their peers' learning. We encourage adults and children to use both rich language and precise vocabulary linked to the subject area that they are learning so that they can understand it and can then use it to reason, articulate and make generalisations.
Impact	Evidence will be gained through pupil voice, lesson observations and performing showing that children can articulate and demonstrate their musical knowledge, skills and understanding using the correct vocabulary. Children will be able to make connections through what they hear, learning to play instruments and enrichment opportunities therefore becoming confident in recognising the inter- related dimensions of music (pulse, pitch, rhythm, dynamics, timbre) through listening, appraising, composing and performance opportunities.
