Changes to the School Day

As a school we are constantly reviewing how we can improve. Our main focus over the last few years has been on developing the children's learning behaviours. We have seen a huge positive impact as a result of this - notedly in the children taking more ownership of their own learning in class. Next year we want to build on the children's increased understanding of the impact of positive learning behaviours by introducing daily 'Class Forums' These forums will be an opportunity for the children to voice their opinions and for them to know their opinions are valid. They will then hopefully see that by expressing them they have the power to make a difference for their own and others futures. During the sessions, they will discuss their learning behaviours and they will have opportunities to feedback on what and how they want to learn. During our trials, one class expressed that they would like more ownership of the content of their creative writing. As a result of this, their teacher changed the following week's lessons to provide them with more ownership and choice. This not only led to fantastic writing, but also showed the children that we respect their views and by expressing them, they can bring about positive change. The class forums will also be an opportunity to celebrate the children's achievements and support their social and emotional development.

We know the Class Forums will be something which will have a huge impact on the children as learners, but more than this we think it will develop them as people. We also understand that there is a risk that introducing a new initiative could mean that other areas of learning suffer because they have less time. To overcome this problem, from September, we are going to extend our school day until 3.25. This extension of the school day also aligns with the Government's Whitepaper for future schools improvement. School will still open at 8.40 and we would encourage all children to arrive at this time. Lessons start at 8.55. The 15 minutes before the first lesson will continue to be 'Ready to Learn Time'. During this time, there are always activities for the children to do and more importantly it is an opportunity for us to check in with all the children and make sure they are happy and ready for their day.

We are excited about these changes and we know the children will love having the opportunity to voice their thoughts and opinions about their learning.
